1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

New Arts, Commerce and Science College, Shevgaon is affiliated to Savitribai Phule University, Pune. It is located in Ahmednagar district of western Maharashtra. The famous Jayakwadi dam on the river Godavari and the religious shrine of Saint Eknath are located at Paithan at a distance of 24 Km. The parent institute Ahmednagar Jilha Maratha Vidya Prasarak Samaj, Ahmednagar founded it in the year 1978. Since then it has transformed into a holistic multidisciplinary institution. It comprises of two campuses spread over an area of 7.75 acres. Current strength of students is 1699. College is under the sections 2(f) and 12B of UGC Act 1956. The college has undergone three cycles of NAAC accreditation. It was accredited with 'A' grade in the 3rd cycle. There are 23 undergraduate and postgraduate programmes. Choice Based Credit System was introduced in 2019 to ensure multiple curricular opportunities to students. It received RUSA Funding in 2019. It is recipient of 'Best Rural College Award' from the parent university. The college gives huge impetus to extension activities and outreach programs. Its efforts towards Extension Activities (Gender Equality) Environment Conservation and tree plantation at both on and off campus are recognized by the Government of Maharashtra with *Jagar Janivancha Award (2012)* and '*Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vanashree Award*' (2023). Certificate courses are offered to promote all round development of students and to equip them with career skills. College is committed to nation-building process by moulding enlightened individuals through academic excellence and holistic education.

It is a private and aided college that offers multidisciplinary co-education at UG and PG level. Some of the programmes offered by the college are self- financed.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

College offers a wide range of programme options and courses that are in tune with the emerging national and global trends and relevant to the local needs. There are 17 undergraduate and 8 postgraduate programs in Arts, Commerce and Science. All these programmes follow the CBCS pattern.

- The institution prepares the academic plan based on the schedules provided by the parent university and strictly adheres to its academic calendar for internal assessments and all the institutional activities.
- The institution offered 28 add-on/certificate and 4 diploma courses during the last five years. Average of 12.72% of students enrolled in such programs during the last five years.
- Cross-cutting issues relevant to professional ethics, gender, human values, environment and sustainability have been effectively integrated into the curriculum of various programmes.
- The affiliating University has integrated experiential learning components such as internships, projects and field works in 6% of the courses taught in the last five years.
- 36.73% of the students completed internships / projects / field works during the last completed academic year.
- IQAC obtains feedback on academic performance and ambience of the institution from students, teachers, employers and alumni for continuous improvement. This helps to enhance effectiveness of learning. The feedback analysis and action taken reports are made available on the institutional website.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Institution serves students of different backgrounds and abilities, through effective teaching-learning experiences.

- About 67.41% of students against the sanctioned seats were admitted during the last five years. 48% of the students admitted were girls.
- 81.61% of seats were filled against seats reserved for SC, ST, OBC, Divyangjan and minorities as per the government reservation policy during the last five years.
- The student-teacher ratio during the last completed year was 1:22.83
- Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies such as field trips, internships, projects and educational tours are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools.
- Percentage of full-time teachers against sanctioned posts during the last five years is 93.35%
- Percentage of full time teachers with NET/SET/SLET/ Ph.D. / M.Phil during the last five years is 45.72%
- All sanctioned posts are filled through a well-structured and transparent recruitment process.
- 17 full-time faculty have completed doctoral degrees and 27 are pursuing Ph.D. in the current academic year.
- Continuous internal and external assessment of the students' performance is transparent and carried out through internal tests, projects, assignments and attendance. Internal examination results are published on the notice board and whatsapp groups.
- The college has a transparent, time-bound and efficient mechanism to address examination related grievances.
- Outcome-based Education is effectively implemented. Attainment of POs, PSOs and COs are stated and displayed on the website. They are measured at the course and programme levels.
- In order to continuously raise quality and achieve higher standards, the institution evaluates the attainment of the stated POs, PSOs and COs and corrective measures are initiated.

- The average pass percentage of the students during the last five years is 75.62%
- The institution conducts student satisfaction surveys on teaching learning on a regular basis.

Research, Innovations and Extension

Institution has devised policies, practices and outcomes with reference to research, innovations and extension activities. Research activities are guided by the **Research Promotion Committee (RPC)** with a well-defined research promotion policy and code of ethics to check malpractices and plagiarisms

- College has received total grant of Rs. 13.25 Lakh from the Government and non-governmental agencies for research projects / endowments during the last five years
- Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has set up an Incubation Centre and a Startup Cell for creation and transfer of knowledge
- 46 programmes were organized on Research Methodology, Intellectual Property Rights, and Entrepreneurship during the last five years.
- On an average 1.11 number of research papers were published per teacher in the Journals notified on UGC care list during the last five years.
- Total number of books and chapters in edited volumes/books published and papers in national/international conference proceedings by teachers during last five years is 39.
- College carries out Extension activities in the neighborhood community through NSS and NCC units in order to students to social issues, for their holistic development. The institution ensures the participation of maximum number of students in these activities.
- Government / government recognized bodies have taken a note of our activities and felicitated it with different awards / citations.
- 26 extension and outreach programmes were conducted by the college by itself and in collaboration with industry, community and NGOs during the last five years. These were useful for community development, social sensitization and holistic growth of students.
- Total number of MoUs, collaborations/linkages for Internship, Field trip, On-the-job training, research and other academic activities during the last five years is 07.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

Infrastructural and learning resources are adequate and there is optimal use of it.

- There are adequate infrastructural and physical facilities like classrooms, laboratories, ICT facilities. Campus is green, well maintained and conducive to teaching, learning and all-round development of students.
- The college is built on 7.75 acre of campus with the total built up area measuring 10772.72 sq. mts.
- The institution has adequate infrastructure required for sports activities. The college gym is well furnished with the latest fitness equipment.
- The institution has 18 ICT enabled classrooms, 1 virtual classroom, 05 computer labs, 3 Seminar halls, 1 audio-visual Studio.
- College library is fully automated using the Integrated Library Management System. College library has a rich collection of academic resources with 49682 books along with 09 newspapers, 24 journals and magazines, encyclopedias, databases.
- Online learning resources like INFLIBNET N-list, E-journals and E-books are available.

- College is also registered with National Digital Library (NDL) an e-resource initiative of the Ministry of Human Resources.
- The institution has subscribed to Shodhganga, E-shodhshindhu databases for providing digital library platform and access to journal database respectively.
- Institution frequently updates its IT facilities to suit the emerging needs. .
- The entire campus is Wi-Fi enabled with internet access points in all floors of the building with a bandwidth of 100 Mbps.
- With a total number of 260 computers and 1 laptop, the computer to student ratio is 1:6
- Expenditure incurred on maintenance of infrastructure during the last five years is Rs. 156.81 Lakh.
- Most of its Power needs are met through 20 kWp solar net metering system.
- The institution has adequate support staff to ensure that the campus is clean and green throughout the year.
- College has facilities such as wheelchairs, ramps, lift and disabled-friendly toilets for the differently-abled.

Student Support and Progression

For the holistic development of students, college takes all the necessary efforts:

- 69.93 Percentage of students have been benefited by scholarships and freeships provided by the Government and Non-Government agencies during the last five years.
- Students of the institution receive training in soft skills, language and communication skills, and in the latest ICT / Computing skills.
- Training is given in life skills like yoga, physical fitness, health and hygiene.
- The institution has in place Grievance Redressal Cell which works on grievances against Sexual Harassment and Ragging. Timely redressal of student grievances is taken care of.
- The Placement and Career Guidance Cell is functional.
- A total of 21.31 percentage of students have benefitted by guidance for competitive examinations and career counseling offered by the Institution during the last five years
- 409 students have progressed to higher education and 241 outgoing students placed during the last five years.
- 22 students have qualified in the state/ national/ international level competitive examinations during the last five years.
- 214 students have appeared in the state/ national/ international level competitive examinations during the last five years.
- 14 college students have received awards/medals for outstanding performance in sports/ cultural activities at University / state/ national / international level during the last five years.
- Students of the Institution participated in average of 231.6 number of sports and cultural programs organised by the institution/other institutions during the last five years.
- The institution has a functional Alumni Association that supports the institute in conducting extension activities. The alumni gives endowment prizes and helps it in cash and kind.

Governance, Leadership and Management

The institution promotes a culture of decentralization and participative management by involving faculty, staff

and students in various academic and administrative committees.

- The governance and leadership is in accordance with vision and mission of the institution.
- The IQAC and the College development Committee formulate strategic plans, draft policies and implements programmes to achieve quality and excellence.
- E-governance is implemented in administration, finance, accounts, student admission, student support and examinations.
- The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff.
- 6.41 percentage of teachers were provided with financial support to attend conferences/workshops and towards membership fee of professional bodies during the last five years.
- 22.91 percentage of teaching and non-teaching staff participated in Faculty development Programmes (FDP), professional development /administrative training programs during the last five years.
- The institution has effective mechanisms for regular academic and administrative auditing.
- Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ non-government organizations)
- Internal and external financial audits are conducted periodically.
- The IQAC coordinates quality assurance strategies of the institution. It plays a significant role in enhancing and internalizing quality standards and making sustainable improvements in the quality of academic processes.
- The IQAC reviews the teaching-learning processes, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals and it also records the incremental improvement in various activities.
- The IQAC meets regularly, analyses feedback for improvement, collaborates with institutes of quality, participates in NIRF and organizes quality audits like ISO.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

The concerns for social responsibilities as well as the values held by the college are explicit in its regular activities.

- College organizes gender sensitization and women empowerment programmes to promote gender equity. It has conducted a gender audit to evaluate the effective institutionalization of gender equity policies.
- The institution celebrates national festivals such as Independence Day, Republic Day and anniversaries of great Indian personalities, national and international commemorative days, events and festivals.
- To reduce dependence on grid electricity and minimize energy bills, college has installed 20 kwp solar grid tie system. It has also installed LED bulbs and power-efficient equipment.
- It has evolved a system to manage degradable and non-degradable waste.
- It has put rainwater harvesting in place to replenish depleting ground water table.
- Campus is maintained clean and green. It is dotted with trees, different species of plants, lawns, cactus garden, medicinal plants etc.
- To make the campus disabled-friendly and barrier free, the college building has ramps at various locations, 1 automatic lift, 2 disabled-friendly washrooms and a wheelchair.
- Green audits, energy audits and environmental audits are conducted.
- College sensitizes neighbouring community to the importance of trees through extension activities carried out by NSS and NCC units. It organizes tree plantation drives, lectures, street plays on saving

the environment.

- Many programmes were organized to sensitize students and employees to provide an inclusive environment.
- Students and employees are made aware of their constitutional obligations, values, rights, and duties of citizens through a variety of programmes.
- Students, faculty and staff adhere to the established code of conduct which is monitored by a committee. Programmes on professional ethics and orientation on the code of conduct have been organized.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	In line with NEP, institution always tries to cater to the needs of students from different streams. Apart from offering regular programmes under Choice Based Credit Semester System, college conducts vocational courses, Community college programmes, certificate courses, value added courses which are open to students of all disciplines. Institution plans to run courses of interdisciplinary nature, organize international events that address multidisciplinary interests, student and faculty exchange initiatives that shall enhance the quality of education to develop human resources as global citizens.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Academic Bank of credits allows a student to learn as

	<p>per her or his convenience, drop education mid-way and pick it up again as per their choice and convenience. Students who have to quit the course on unforeseen grounds too shall benefit from credit transfer and credit accumulation in the ABC model. College has registered itself with Academic Bank of credits on ABC website. It has also made students aware of the ABC facility and encouraged them for opening Academic Bank Account. All students of college have opened their ABC accounts.</p>
3. Skill development:	<p>College combines classroom teaching with experiential learning like on the job training, field visits, project work. The college has commenced four diploma courses in line with NSQF under UGC's Community College Scheme. College also runs a vocational course in Functional English for undergraduate students to upgrade human skills towards creating employable youth. To upgrade the skills of students pertaining to Soft Skills, Communication, Professional and Research Skills, college offers certificate and add on courses in Professional Writing, Communication Skills, Website Using WordPress, Tally ERP (9), MS Office, Chromatography, Yoga and Physical Fitness .In future, the institution aims to take up more courses in line with the Government of India's National Skills Qualification Framework (NSQF). After successful completion of these courses students are eligible to earn two credits per course. College plans to introduce online or blended courses in association with NSDC in near future.</p>
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	<p>Integration of Indian Knowledge system is achieved through having exclusive departments of Marathi and Hindi. In order to promote Indian culture and inculcate national spirit among youths, activities such as Yoga day, Yoga workshop, ethnic cuisine, folkdance and folk dress competitions are organized. Translation method of teaching is used occasionally to explain difficult concepts in science and literature. College has brought out a special issue of its annual magazine 'Trushart' on Folk culture and art. College has organized a National Level Seminar on "National Education Policy and Indian Languages with financial support from Central Hindi Directorate, Agra.</p>
5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	<p>Institution has clearly stated Programme Outcomes</p>

	<p>(PO), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSO) and Course outcomes (CO) for all the courses offered by it. These are in line with the spirit of NEP. Seminars, workshops and meetings were organized to acquaint the faculty with the need and framework of OBE. Efforts are being made to implement Bloom's taxonomy at various levels – from setting of the question banks to evaluation of the quality of question papers and exam results. Based on Blooms Taxonomy, college determines learning levels ranging from 1 to 4. The performance of students is evaluated by direct and indirect method. Students' performance against the target level 4 is around 2.83.</p>
<p>6. Distance education/online education:</p>	<p>The College has been strengthening its resources to be able to offer conventional and vocational courses through ODL (Open Distance Learning) mode. Blended learning as envisaged in New Education Policy is being achieved through Digital platforms like Google Classroom, Zoom, E-content Development Studio, virtual classrooms, google forms etc. These tools are widely used for engaging classes, conducting meetings, webinars, workshops, assignments, quizzes, surveys and assessments. College has been using online and offline digital repositories, digital media like e-content, You tube for virtual learning. Credit-based recognition of MOOCs on SWAYAM platform will be encouraged in future. Education of global standards can be achieved through institutional collaboration.</p>

It has been set up to promote electoral literacy among the students through engaging and interesting activities. Effective Curriculum Planning:

The college ensures effective curriculum planning and delivery through well planned and documented process. Academic Planning is done at three levels:

1. Institutional Level
2. Departmental Level
3. Faculty Level

Curriculum Planning at Institutional Level:

Academic Calendar: At the beginning of an academic session, Academic Planning Committee comprising Principal, Vice Principals, College Examination Officer and Heads of all departments prepares an Academic calendar. The same is communicated to the students and teachers through website, central notice board, and departmental notices.

Time Table: A master time table for the academic session is prepared by the time table committee which efficiently deploys the time slots for theory lectures and practical sessions. Based on master timetable departmental time tables are prepared. The time table for skill based certificate courses is prepared separately.

Academic Plans of Various Committees:

The action plan of various committees such as NSS, NCC, Board of Students Development, Literary Association, Science Association etc. for the entire academic year is prepared by the concerned committee in consultation with the Principal.

Curricular Planning at Departmental Level:

Departmental Time Table:

Based on Master Time table Heads of all Departments prepare departmental time-table in consultation with departmental faculty. Effective and efficient curriculum delivery is monitored and reviewed by Heads of the departments, Vice Principals and the Principal during periodical meetings. Necessary suggestions and instructions are given if needed.

Departmental Meetings:

Head of each department conducts departmental meetings to discuss workload distribution, teaching methods, activities to be carried out during the academic session. During these meetings, it is ensured that curriculum is being delivered as per plan.

Curriculum Planning at Faculty Level:

Teachers' Diaries:

Every teacher maintains a teacher diary which contains individual time table, teaching plans, record of leaves, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities and daily teaching.

Effective Curriculum Delivery:

Use of Novel Teaching Methods:

Principal and Heads of the departments encourage and motivate the faculty to use new teaching methods as well as ICT tools in teaching. It enhances students' learning capabilities and interest. Besides this, experiential, participative and problem solving methodologies etc. are effectively employed.

Identification of Learning Levels:

The Slow and Advanced learners are identified through a screen test conducted at the beginning of each academic year by the respective departments. It helps the faculty to take necessary measures to address Slow and Advanced learners' needs.

Use of E-Learning Resources:

During COVID- 19 epidemic period faculty made effective and efficient use of various online social platforms and E-Learning Resources. During this period, students from remote and distanced places had difficulty of access to network. Faculty overcame this difficulty by preparing a vast database of E-Content and providing them online. Students could access this database at their convenience.

Feedback Mechanism:

Feedback mechanism from students, parents, alumni, helps it to revise its teaching methods, teachers' performance. It also helps it to find out the areas in which teaching-learning resources are to be augmented.

diploma courses and various awareness programmes conducted by the college.

Integration of Professional Ethics:

Institute meticulously follows the curriculum prescribed by the university. It integrates modules on Professional Ethics viz. *'Prakasahan Vyawahar and Sadnyapan'* (23025) (Publication and Printing in Marathi), Marathi for Social Media and New Age Media (24011), Skill Enhancement Courses in Hindi Translation and Script Writing (), Oral Communication in English: Intermediate and Key Competency Modules (11952 & 24852), Entrepreneurship Development, Project Report and Oral Communication in English: Advanced (3858) offered under B. A. Programmes in Marathi, Hindi and English. These deal with Professional Ethics pertinent to writing, publications and Entrepreneurship skill development. Some other courses such as Business Ethics, Business Communication offered under Commerce faculty inculcate professional ethics among the students. Besides, above courses the college adhering to the local needs, runs four diploma courses in **'Farm Equipment and Machinery, Aquaculture, Poly House Technology and Advanced IT'**, under community college. These courses promote self employment and professional ethics. College organizes Workshops and Webinars on Intellectual Property Rights and Patenting to make students aware of policies and procedures of copyrights.

Gender Equality and Human Values:

Gender equality is of immense importance to maintain equilibrium and social harmony. Number of courses offered across UG and PG programmes in Humanities and Social Sciences integrate issues related to gender disparity and human values. The literary works taught under language programmes are major repositories by which human values are fostered among the students. Prescribed texts such as **'Prakashwata'** an autobiography of Raman Magsaysay Awardee Prakash Baba Amate is the testimony of social services one can render to the society. Human values such as brotherhood, religious tolerance, respect for cultural diversity, Gender equality etc. are reflected through literary texts prescribed in the syllabi.

Courses under social sciences address to the issues of Gender Equality, Indian Constitution, fundamental rights and duties of citizens. They also orient students to the values of equality, liberty and sovereignty. These values are fostered among students through celebration of National and International Days, anniversaries of social reformers, national leaders and special events.

Functional statutory cells and the Gender audit are testimony to the integration of cross-cutting issues in college.

Environment and Sustainability:

The issues of Environment and Sustainability are dealt with through curricular and extension activities run by college. Environment Awareness course is a mandatory course at undergraduate level. Undergraduate and Post-graduate programmes in science stream, activities carried out by NSS, NCC and BSD also deal with environment and sustainability.

COVID-19 epidemic did not hinder our endeavor towards making students aware of cross-cutting issues. College had organized COVID-19 Awareness Campaign. As a part of it, student-volunteers prepared and distributed about four thousand masks in neighborhood community and to officers on duty during the lockdown.

Above activities adopted and carried out by college show its accountability towards these national issues.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences using ICT tools

Response:

Response:

In order to enhance learning experiences of students, faculty employs different student centric methods. These help to enhance key areas learning such as Knowledge, Skills, Values and Attitude. The teaching learning process is made efficient and effective through experiential learning approaches, participative learning techniques and problem solving methodologies. It is our endeavor to couple these methods with ICT tools. Integration of ICT in teaching learning process facilitates students to learn at their own space and time.

Experiential Learning:

Experiential learning is employed by faculty in order to make teaching effective wherever necessary. Experiential learning such as study tours, field visits, internships, role playing etc. helps students understand different concepts thoroughly and makes learning experience interesting. For example, students of functional English have a course on Mass Media in their curriculum. To supplement theoretical classroom teaching, students are taken to Radio Station and introduced to actual functioning of recording studio.

Participative learning:

Participative learning methods such as group discussions, seminars, webinars, quizzes etc. have proved to be of immense help in enhancing students' learning.

Problem solving Methods:

These methods are used by teachers to increase students' inquisitiveness, imaginative capabilities, logical thinking etc.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time- bound and efficient

Response:

The mechanism of internal and external assessment of the college is transparent and robust. It follows the norms and guidelines laid down by Savitribai Phule Pune University, Pune.

Mechanism of Internal Assessment:

As per CBCS pattern the internal assessment carries 30% weightage for UG and PG programmes in Science faculty, 30% and 40% weightage respectively for UG and PG programmes in Commerce faculty and 30% & 50% weightage respectively for UG and PG programmes in humanities and Social Sciences. The modules of internal assessment comprises of mid-term internal examination, assignment, project report, student seminars, Group discussion, and oral examination. Internal assessment is carried out at departmental and faculty level. During Covid-19 epidemic the internal examinations were conducted online through google forms. The department and faculty wise schedule of internal assessment is prepared by Examination committee in consultation with respective heads of the departments. After finalization of the schedule, it is incorporated in the academic calendar.

Mechanism of External Assessment:

In CBCS pattern external assessment carries 70% weightage for UG and PG programmes in Science faculty, 70% and 60% weightage respectively for UG and PG programmes in Commerce faculty and 70% & 50% weightage respectively for UG and PG programmes in humanities and Social Sciences. The schedule, Questions papers, Answer sheets, Barcode and Holocraft for external examination are given by the affiliating university. University appoints Senior External Supervisor for smooth and fair conduction of examination. The college also appoints a senior faculty as an internal senior supervisor.

Evidences of Transparency:

- Students are informed of the evaluation process and the allocation of marks beforehand, to ensure transparency and clarity.
- The answer scripts of internal examination are evaluated within a week after the examination. The evaluated answer sheets are made available to students for verification in the classroom. Concerned faculty also provides a feedback on students' performance.
- The examination work allocation is done well before the dates of actual examination. The supervision orders stating the duties and responsibilities of Jr. supervisors are given well in advance.
- The college implements zero misconduct during examination policy.
- The paper assessment takes place in the examination room/ CAP center under CCTV surveillance.
- The marks of every internal examination are verified by the Principal. Verified marks are filled in online system by concerned teachers.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism:

Continuous internal assessment system is operational in our college. If there are complaints about the question papers during the examination, they are addressed immediately and the students are notified about the changes, if any.

Grievance Redressal Mechanism of college operates at two levels: Departmental and College. In case of any grievance, student may approach the concerned teacher for clarification. If the student is not satisfied he/she can approach the redressal cell for further clarifications. Any common grievance relating to internal assessment may be forwarded to Internal Examination Grievance Redressal Committee. Students can also drop their complaints in the complaint box.

Grievances related to external examination are forwarded to university on receipt of application stating the nature of grievance from the students.

The university prescribed curriculum is outcome based and has well defined POs, and Cos for all programmes and courses. Cos for certificate and skill oriented courses are defined separately.

Creation of POs and Graduate Attribute:

- POs, and COs are prepared by keeping institutional vision and mission at centre. The process of creation of POs and COs takes place at two levels: Department and College.
- Faculty members and Head of the respective departments take up discussion on creation of POs and Cos in departmental meetings.
- Academic Planning committee comprising off head of all departments take up discussion on skill set required in job market and prepares the first draft of outcomes.
- These drafts then are taken up for discussion in IQAC meeting to determine the graduate attributes.

Means of Communicating POs, PSOs and COs:

- The outcomes are communicated to all stake holders through college website and prospectus, departmental notice boards and central notice board.
- Teachers enumerate and explain the course outcomes in their respective classes at the beginning of academic session.
- Faculty wise Principal's address to entry level students is one of the means of communicating POs, PSOs and graduate attributes.
- The importance of learning outcomes is communicated to the teachers through IQAC. The teachers of the institute are actively involved in syllabus framing workshops, where they contribute in asserting POs, COs and PSOs in curriculum.

Attainment of Programme outcomes and course outcomes:

The college has its well defined mechanism for the evaluation of the attainment of POs, PSOs and COs. The modalities are as follows:

- There are two methods for mapping POs and Cos in practice: Direct and Indirect method of assessment.
- Direct method of assessment involves result analysis of both internal and external examinations into five target levels. The average outcome attainment level of college at present is 2.40. This method of mapping is in practice for both POs and Cos.
- COs are continuously evaluated through academic progress of the students.

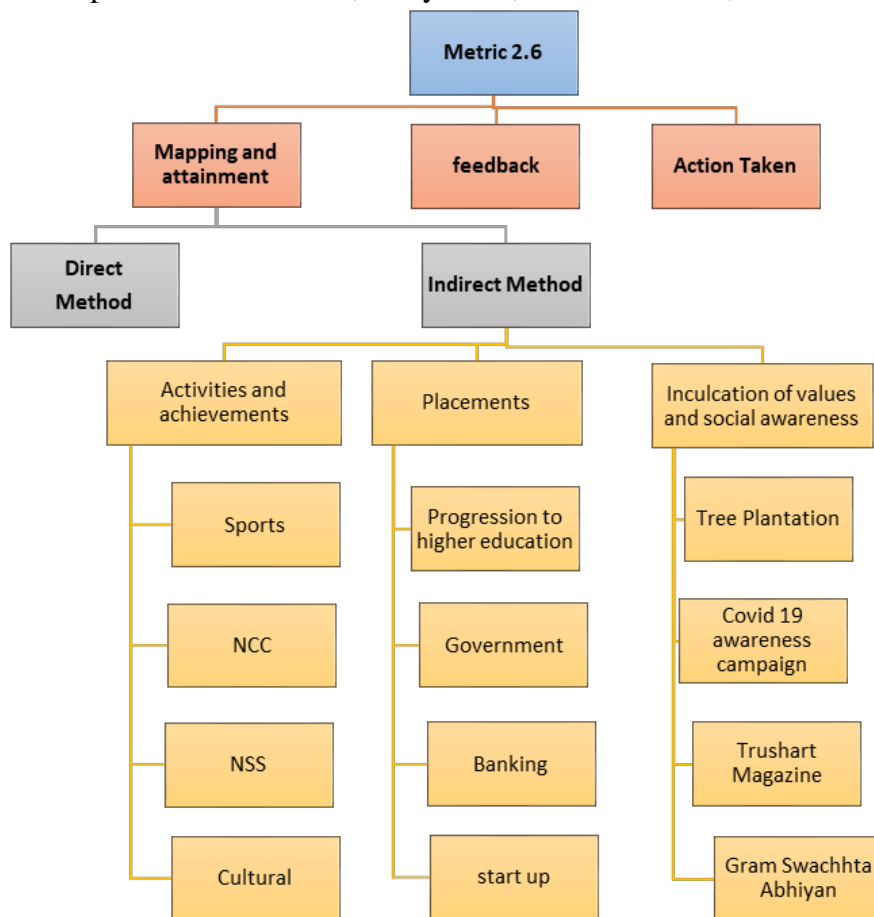
Indirect Method of Assessment:

Indirect method of PO and CO assessment involves tracking students' performance and achievements in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities such as: Sports, Cultural Events, Placement and Extension Activities. These activities are organized for the holistic development of students.

- Participation of students in various community-oriented extension activities organized by NSS, NCC and Board of Students Development units help to inculcate socio-ethical values and thereby leads students to take social responsibilities.
- As direct evaluation of the attainment of POs, and COs are mapped 70% through university examination and 30% internal assessment, the indirect evaluation is carried out through students

participation and achievements in extracurricular activities as well as progression to higher education.

- The unique feature of this mechanism is that there is an excellent blending of subjective observation and objective assessment of the students performance.
- The teachers also assess the development of students and their performance through observation, classroom interactions and personal counselling.
- The participation of students in departmental activities, study tours, industrial visits, etc. also help in gauging their growth.

3.2 Innovation Ecosystem

3.2.1 Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations and has initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

Response:

Response:

NACSCS recruits dynamic, talented and enterprising young faculty as well as non-teaching staff through proper selection process. It involves testing of knowledge through interviews and teaching skills through demo lectures. Annual Performance Appraisal System (APA) is in practice to encourage faculty to enhance their teaching, learning and research skills. Faculty members are encouraged to undergo Training and Professional Development Programmes such as MS-DEED, FDP, Orientation and Refresher Programmes. Teaching Faculty members are encouraged to pursue Research degrees. This ultimately contributes in creating an ambiance prone to innovations. Visits of Internationally acclaimed scientists, professors and experts make budding researchers know the recent developments in the field of science and technology. The institution strives hard to inculcate research culture among both faculty and students. As a part of the initiative, the college has procured advanced equipment like HPLC in the Chemistry laboratory. Organization of regular annual events such as Scientific Rangoli Competition, E-Poster Presentation, Model and Chart making competitions provide platform to the innovative ideas of students. Diploma and certificate courses in Web Designing, Advanced IT and Website using Wordpress make our students capable of competing in job market. This leads to the emergence of start-ups.

Many departments of the college are committed to building up of innovation ecosystem through their interactions, collaborations with industry, NGOs, and recognized research labs. The commerce department of the college in collaboration with Tally International Ltd. Bangalore has been running a course in 'Accounting in Tally ERP-9' for the last four years. The Chemistry department promotes research culture among students through a laboratory having high end equipment such as HPLC, GC, UVDRS, Cyclic voltammetry. This laboratory helps students to have hands on experience prior to entering job markets like pharmaceutical industry.

Many programs and courses have projects in their curriculum which are undertaken by the students. These projects help in inculcating innovation and research culture among them.

The diploma courses viz. Farm Equipment and Machinery, Aquaculture, Web Design and Advanced IT and Poly-House Technology are run under UGC sponsored Community College Scheme. These courses through experiential learning create proper ambience for innovation. Even the MoUs with industry and NGOs provide students an opportunity to know how the processes in Pharmaceutical Industry work. The MoU with H. U. Gugale Agrobiotech Ltd. Provides students information with regard to Tissue Culture Practices. The incubation cell is functional Under the MoU with Maharashtra Information Technology Support Centre (MITSC), Maharashtra increase the knowledge of our students about startups. The placement cell of the college that invites various industries for placement, makes students aware of the market requirements and thereby promotes innovation.

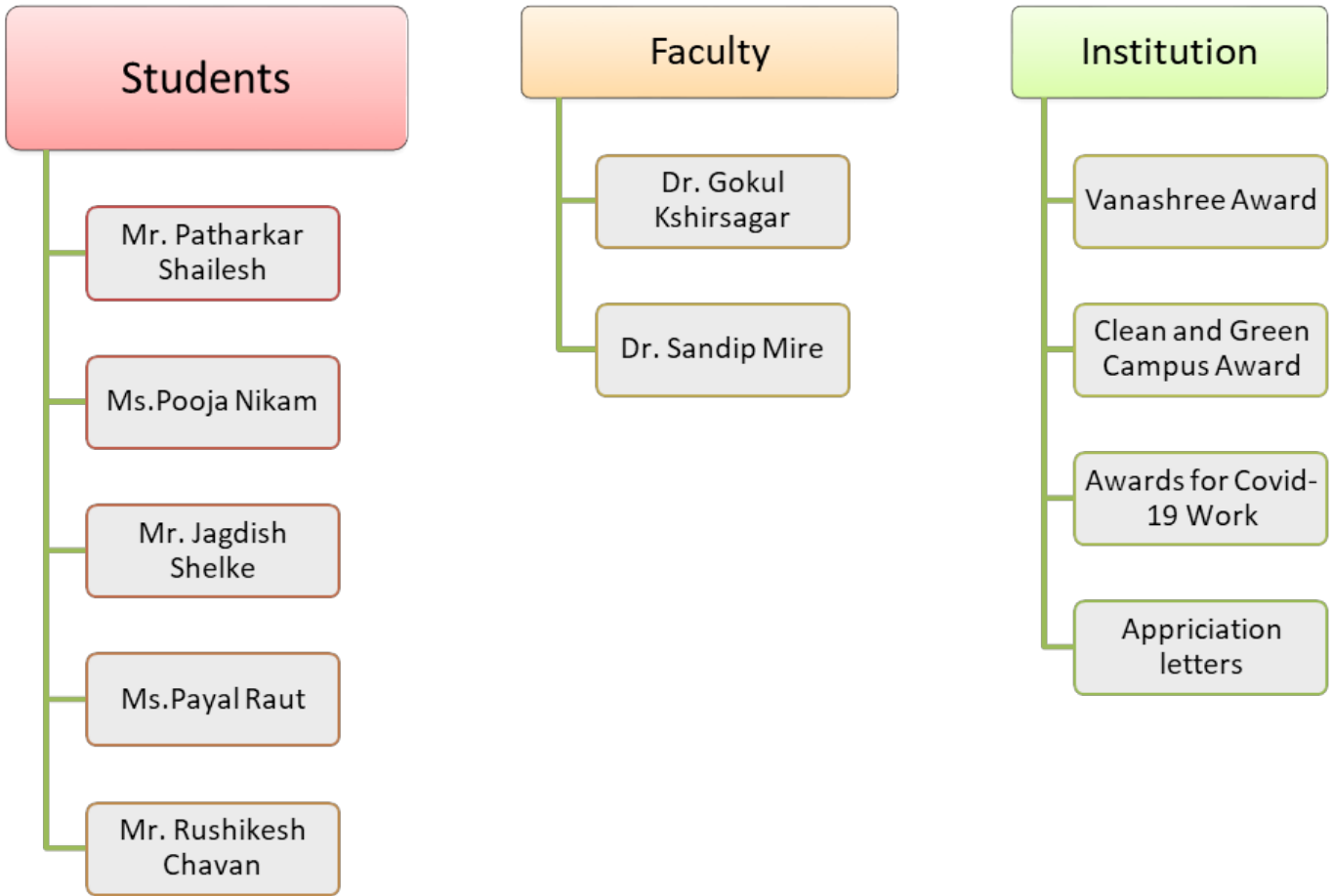

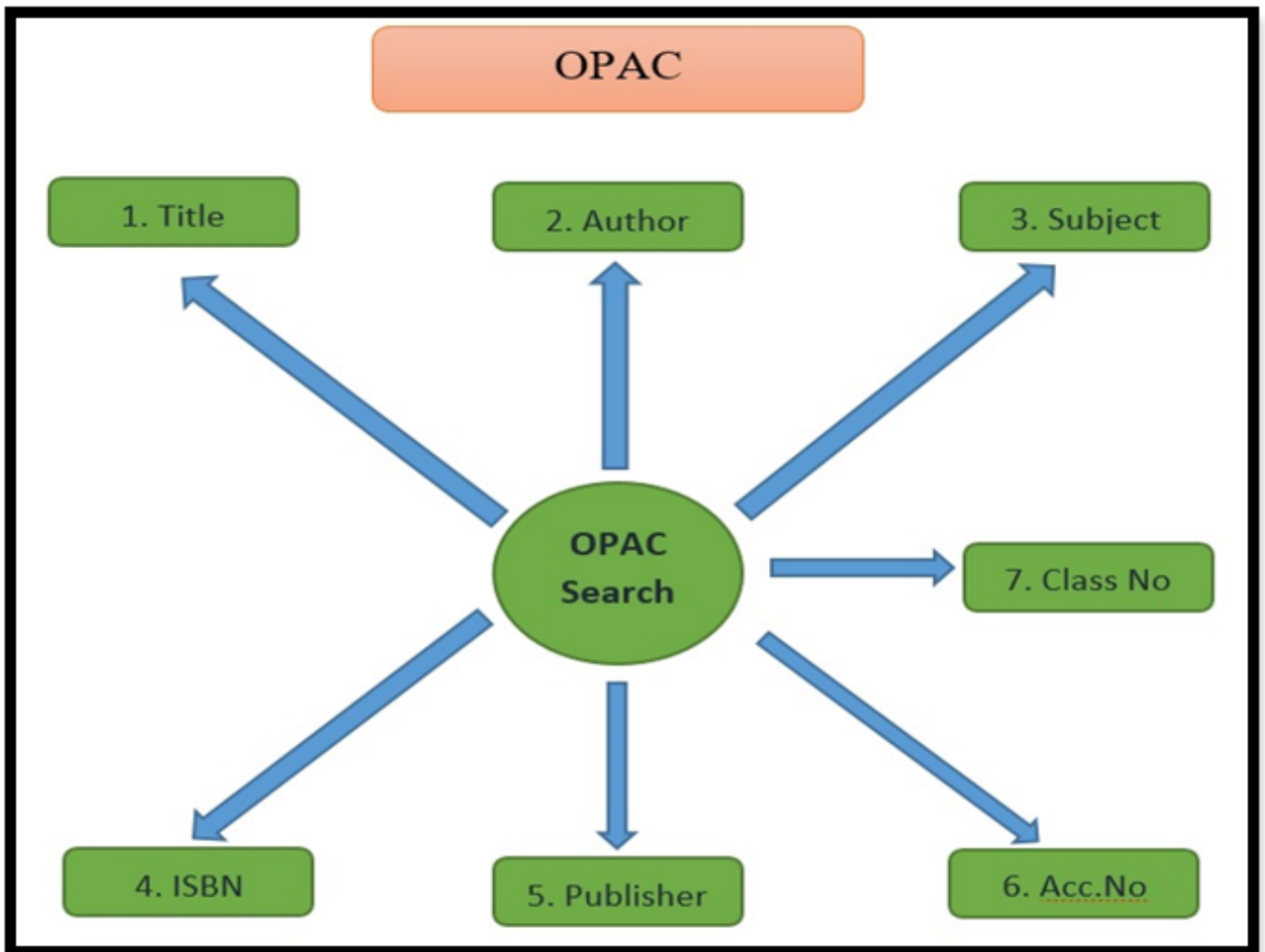
Response:

The library is spread over an area of 562.44 m². It offers various services to users like automated circulation system with barcode, online public access catalogue, reprography, internet browsing, library orientations, inter-library loan facility, book bank facility, newspaper clipping, Reference service and Reading room facility etc. It has an adequate number of textual and reference books, audio video cassettes. It has subscription to various journals, periodicals, newspapers and E- resources. There is a functional library committee which meets at the beginning of every academic year, discusses its requirements and prepares an action plan to be carried out during the year. It is fully automated since 2014. It has 8 computers, Barcode Scanner, SOUL 2.0., Vriddhi, User-Tracking Software. There is provision of power backup for an uninterrupted access of library facilities

Integrated Library Management System:

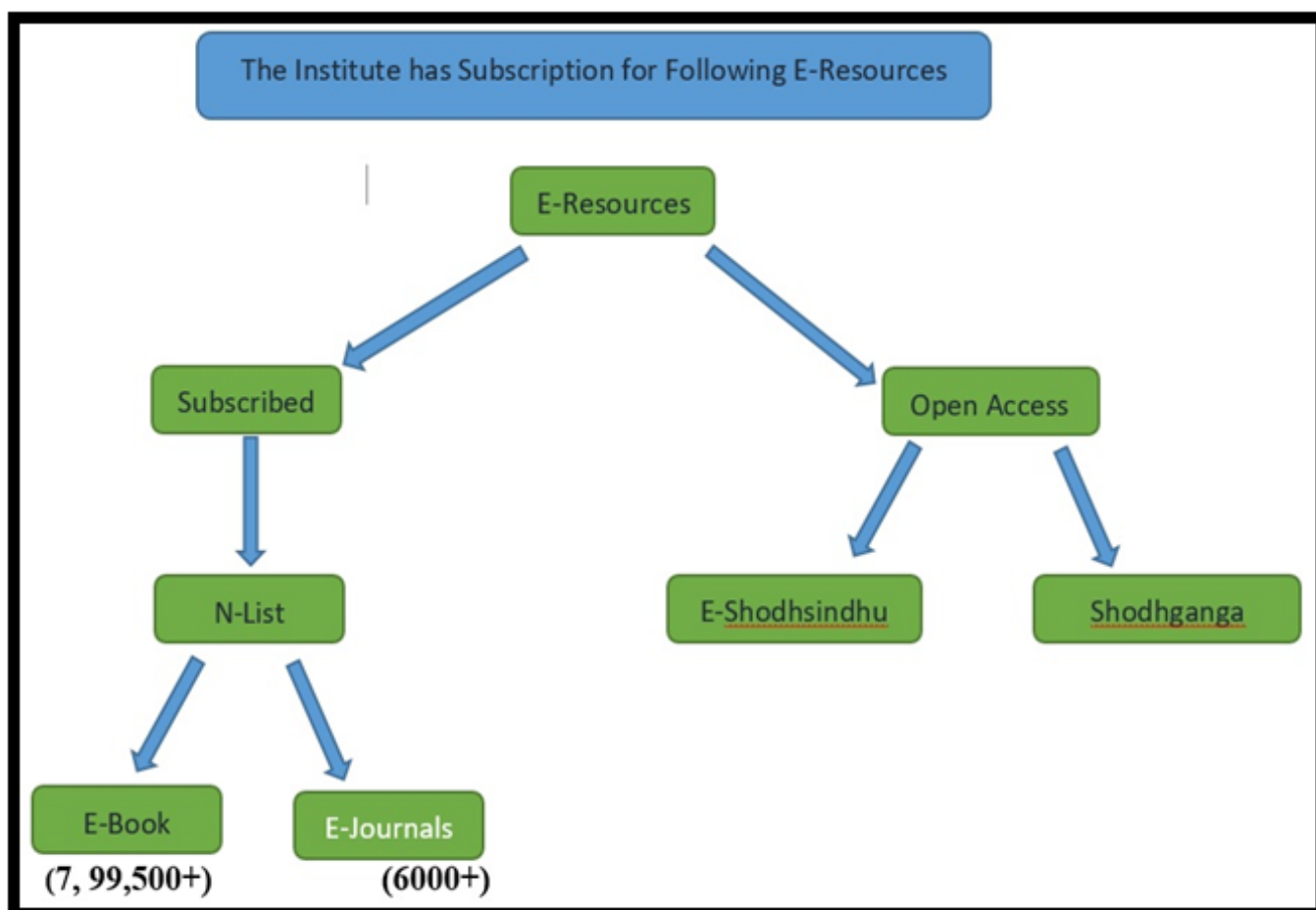
Library uses SOUL 2.0 library software. It is user friendly and developed to work in a client-server. Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) is designed by the INFLIBNET Center, Ahmadabad, Gujarat. This software consists of modules such as acquisition, cataloguing, circulation, serial control, OPAC, administration, etc. Various activities of the library such as data entry, book issue and return, renewal of books, member login etc. are done through the software. The books issue and return processes are carried out using barcode reader. OPAC provides a facility to search details of books. User can search books using criteria like Author, Title, Publisher, Accession Number, Classification Number, ISBN No. etc. The library is equipped with NVDA for blind users. The notice board in the library displays a QR code which can be used by user to access library website.

College has recently updated its website to accommodate all the requirements of its stakeholders. It is changed its domain name from .com to nacscs.ac.in.

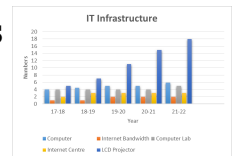
Augmentation of Internet Bandwidth and Server:

Faculty Participation in Management:

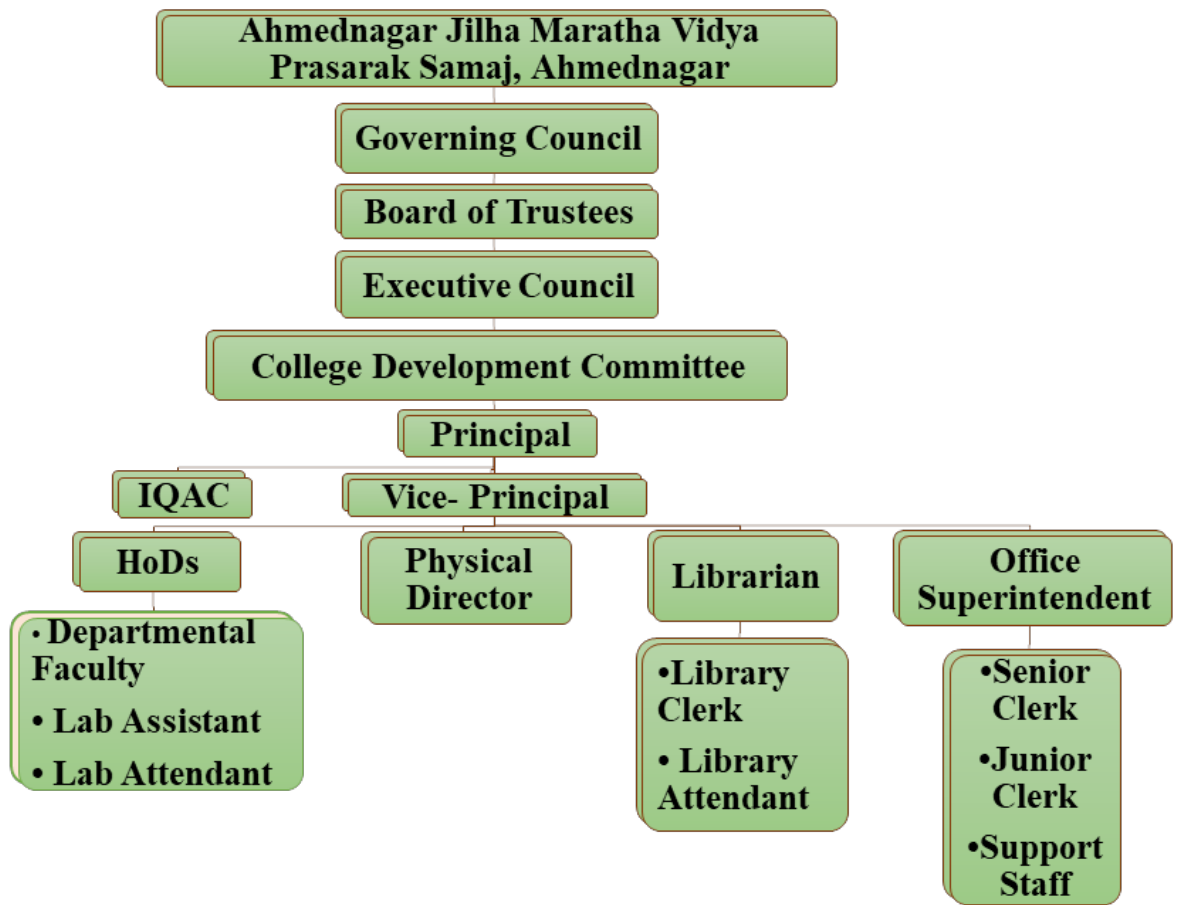
Faculty members participate in the management process through CDC. Faculty have representation on the Governing Council of the Parent Institution.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment and service rules, procedures, deployment of institutional Strategic/ perspective/development plan etc

Response:

The institutional Organogram reflects the hierarchical, democratic, decentralised, participative and inclusive approach of the Management as represented by the different units. Each unit has functional autonomy.

Administrative Set Up at College Level:

The College Development Committee is the apex decision making body. It meets regularly to review and discuss the development plans. It also approves the budget for the academic year and takes review of the implementation of utilization of the budget.

The decisions of CDC are executed by the Principal and the IQAC. Principal is a link between the management and the staff. The Vice Principal assists the Principal in the academic and administrative matters of the institution. The Heads of the Departments support the Principal in the execution of plans and supervise the smooth functioning of their respective departments. They strive to achieve goals in coordination with the faculty and distribute works equitably amongst them. The College examination Officer is responsible for the effective conduct of internal and university exams while adhering to quality standards as per the university requirements. The Office superintendent works as head of the administrative staff, guiding and coordinating the activities of the Administrative Office. The Student Welfare Officer takes care of student support and other student welfare matters. The Librarian ensures that the library provides efficient services for better learning outcomes. The Director of Physical Education leads the physical fitness, sports, games and athletic activities. IQAC, led by its Coordinator takes care of the development and application of quality benchmarks and parameters for various academic and administrative activities of the institution. In addition to the statutory committees mandated by the UGC and Government, various non-statutory committees function hand-in-hand to coordinate all activities.

Recruitment and Promotion of permanent faculty as well as staff is based on the UGC regulations and Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) whereas appointments of staff for the unaided courses are done on merit by the management. Secretary of the Parent Institution/ Management is the appointing authority. Promotions of all staff are governed by the service rules and policies of the government. Merit, Character and conduct are given due consideration. Policies on Code of Conduct as well as Policies with regard to all crucial procedures related to the administration, academics and maintenance of the Institution are adhered to in all respects.

Deployment of Perspective Plan:

Ever since its inception the college has seen continuous growth in the areas of academics and infrastructural development. To sustain its growth, the college has drafted a perspective plan based on the recommendation of NAAC report (3rd Cycle) in the year 2017 and inputs from all stakeholders. It is in line with the vision and mission of the institution. It caters to the academic, infrastructural and employment needs of the students. 6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures and Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

Welfare Schemes for teaching and non-teaching staff:

- **Loans:**

Financial needs of teaching and non-teaching staff are met through Ahmednagar District Secondary Teachers' Co-operative Credit Society. This credit society provides loan facilities for its members up to Rs. 22 Lakh in different categories like Emergency Loan, Guarantor Loan, Educational Loan, Housing Loan etc. at nominal rates of interest. It also felicitates wards of its members for their outstanding achievements in education. On the occasion of their daughter's marriage members receive a financial aid of Rs. 10,000 from the society. The entire loans of members who die in service are waived off. The responsibility of documentation to become member of the society, deduction of membership fee and collection of instalment, necessary certification is shouldered by the college. All these responsibilities are assigned to a special clerical staff.

Sevak Kalyan Nidhi/ Welfare Loan: In addition to above credit society, employees of the college also have facility of availing loans from *Sevak Kalyan Nidhi*. Employees contribute to this fund every month. In emergency cases, it gives loans to members up to Rs. 1.80 Lakh. Its members also receive a Gratitude Fund from it on their retirement.

- **Leaves:**

Teaching and non-teaching staff is granted leaves like casual, medical, duty, FIP, paternity, maternity etc.

- Financial Assistance to Teachers is given to participate in Seminars, conferences, symposia, workshops etc.
- In order to avail of housing loans, personal loan college issues salary certificate to its employees.
- Necessary documentation for reimbursement of medical bills is done by the college.
- The college maintains accounts of Provident Fund, DCPS/ NPS of both teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Pension documents of retiring employees are prepared and submitted to government by the college.
- Preparation of documentation for the promotion of employees is done by the college.
- On the day of *Vijayadashami*, the parent institute felicitates its employees for their remarkable achievements. These employees are also felicitated on the occasion of college level Prize Distribution Ceremony.
- In case of an emergency, college collects an emergency fund from its employees to help the needy employee to meet the medical expenses.
- Skill Enhancement Programmes are organized by the college for its employees. They are also deputed to participate in Skill Enhancement Programmes organized by other institutes/ agencies.
- Canteen food is provided to the staff at concessional rates.
- Canteen facilities are provided inside the campus at subsidized rates for students teaching and nonteaching staff.
- Well- secured parking and charging points for E-Vehicles are made available for employees.

Performance Appraisal System:

To monitor the performance of faculty and non-teaching staff, performance appraisal system is in place. It is monitored through API and PBAS forms, CR forms, Feedback forms and Academic and Administrative audits. These forms are submitted to the IQAC. After proper scrutiny, the Principal gives necessary instructions to the concerned employees to enhance their skills and knowledge. Teaching and non-teaching staff act upon these instructions in the period that follows.

6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

6.4.1 Institution has strategies for mobilization and optimal utilization of resources and funds from various sources (government/ nongovernment organizations) and it conducts financial audits regularly (internal and external)

Response:

The institution has a well-defined strategy for mobilization of funds and optimal utilization of resources. The college is affiliated to Savitribai Phule Pune University Pune and follows the rules and regulations laid

down by the Govt. of Maharashtra/UGC. College receives its funds from UGC, RUSA, SPPU and other governmental and non-governmental agencies. The funds received are utilized for academic and infrastructural development. Apart from this, the college mobilizes funds through alumni contribution/donation, individuals, self-financed courses etc.

1. Following methods are in use for funds Generation.

- College generates funds from admission fees of Grant in Aid and self-financed programmes. It also receives funds from Government and Non-Government agencies. College also receives aid in cash and kind form from alumni. During the last five years college has received **Rs. 2,13,25,000/-** amount as grants from RUSA, ICSSR, ICHR and Affiliating University for augmentation of infrastructure and to undertake research work.

Fund Mobilization:

College has internal mechanism for mobilization of funds. It mobilizes its funds for completing research projects, infrastructure augmentation, implementation of Earn and Learn Scheme, Students' welfare scheme, admission fees and organization of seminar, conferences, extension activities under NSS and NCC etc. College meets most of its financial needs from its own resources. Parent institute also helps in case of higher infrastructural development projects.

Optimum utilization of financial resources:

Following system is adopted by the college for the optimal utilization of resources.

- The accounts section prepares the annual budget as per the requirement from different departments and committees.
- The annual budget is placed for discussion and approval in CDC meeting. Approved budget is properly utilized.
- The CDC and IQAC monitors the proper utilization of the sanctioned amount.

Optimal Utilization of Physical Resources:

The physical facilities such as seminar halls, E-content Development Studio, Virtual Classroom, Playground, and Library books, Computers, laboratories etc. are optimally utilized by rigorous planning and time-management. Anyone willing to utilize these facilities is required to take prior permission of the concerned coordinator and Principal. These facilities are provided on first come first serve basis. In case of books in the library, user needs to return the issued book within 7 days. For optimal utilization of laboratories, students are divided into batches.

Optimal Utilization of Human Resources:

College does its best to recruit vacant teaching and non-teaching positions on priority basis. It sees that no post is left vacant. In case of leaves of absence of any employee, his or her responsibilities are entrusted to substitute employees. Teaching and non-teaching staff are deputed to participate in various professional development courses. College sees to it that the faculty is well trained and efficient.

Response:

Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a significant role in institutionalizing quality assurance strategies and processes. During the last five years, IQAC has strengthened quality assurance processes such as:

Academic Planning: Every year IQAC meets in the beginning of the year and discusses and approves the academic calendar prepared by the Academic Planning Committee. The academic calendar comprises of curricular, co-curricular, extra-curricular activities and details of continuous internal evaluation to be carried out in the year. The IQAC monitors and reviews the progress in this regard through periodic meetings.

Perspective Plan: IQAC has prepared a short term and long term perspective plan as a post accreditation initiative. This perspective plan states institutional activities with respect to Academic, Infrastructure, Research, Extension etc. progress. It has clearly stated institution's plans for each year and a comprehensive development plan for five years.

Quality Audits: To have sustained improvement in quality IQAC conducts various types of quality audits periodically such as ISO, AAA, green audit, environmental audit, energy audit etc. Quality audits are also done through CDC meetings, meetings with the Principal, Departmental meetings etc.

As a result of initiatives undertaken by IQAC, college could make significant progress in following areas and activities.

Integration of ICT in Teaching learning as well as Governance

4. **Faculty Participation in online FDP, Refresher and Orientation Courses:** During the last five years faculty members have attended 93 FDP/RC/OC/ Induction programs that have helped enhance their technical and academic expertise.

6. Use of ICT based teaching learning material and Platforms such as Google Classroom, Canvas etc.

- Encouraging faculty members to submit proposal for financial assistance to undertake major /minor Research Projects. During the last five years college has received 05 number of research projects.
- As a result of research culture in the college 15 faculty members have been awarded Ph.D. degrees, 01 have submitted their thesis and 10 are pursuing Ph. D.
- IQAC encourages faculty members to publish scholarly articles in the reputed journals. As a result 83 research papers have been published during the last five years.
- Financial assistance is given to participate in Seminar/workshops and Conferences.
- Encouraging faculty for writing books, chapters in book and research papers. As a result faculty have published 39 book chapters and papers in conference proceedings
- Promotion of research ethics through organization of workshop on IPR
- IQAC submits AQARs in time.
- Organization of certificate and Add on courses for students

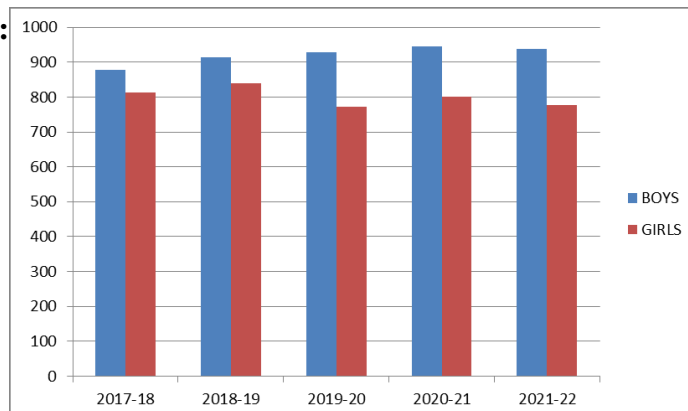
Measures Initiated for Gender Equity:

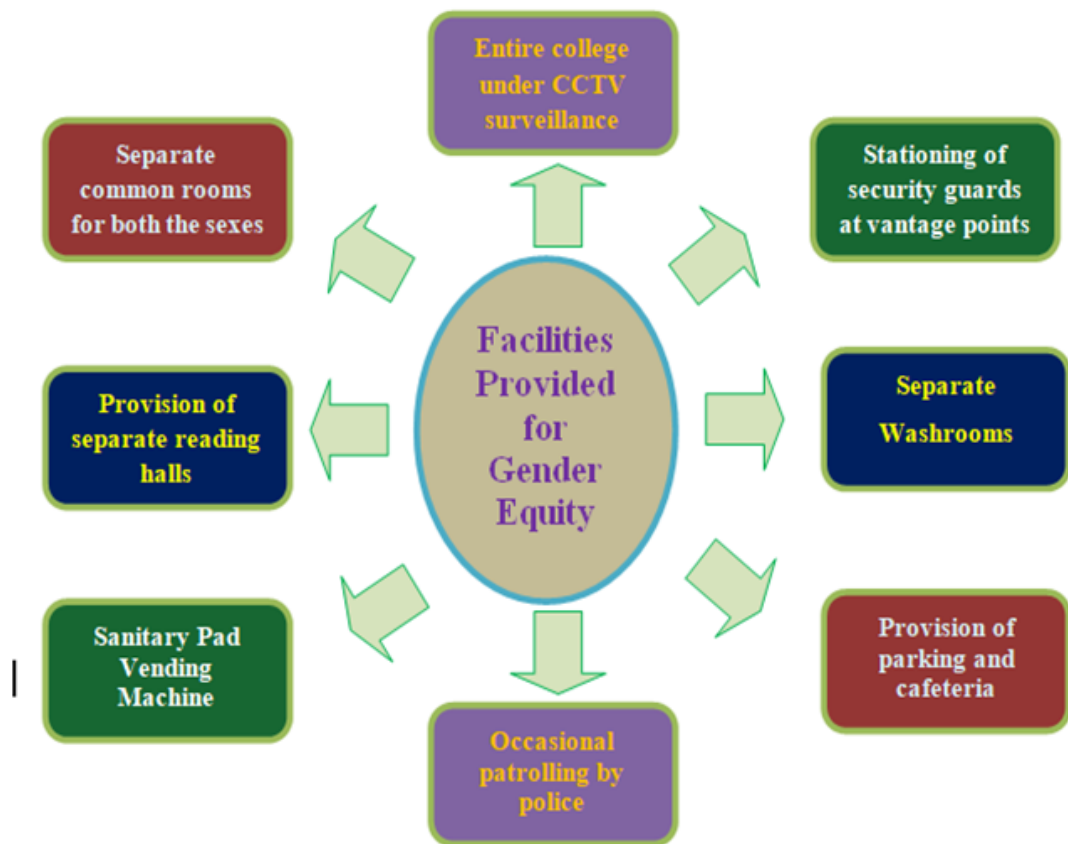

- To acquaint students to their social responsibilities as citizen of the country
- To provide students a platform to discharge their social responsibilities
- To make them understand the importance of maintaining surrounding environment healthy and clean

The Context:

It is observed that in this era of materialistic approach towards life, students seem to be absorbed in attaining their materialistic goals by any means. Thereby, they seem to neglect their social responsibilities. Despite many attempts, to make the citizens aware of social issues viz. Environment conservation, Gender Equality, Disaster management and inculcation of national spirit, these issues are confronting us with more severity. These issues can be attended to at family, immediate society and at the level of educational institutions in which they are studying. College feels it its imperative to address these issues through creating awareness among students by involving them in extension activities.

The Practice:

The college carries out extension activities for the benefit of students through NCC, NSS, Board of Students' Development units and volunteers. Every year, College plans and implements various extension activities that address social issues

Creating Awareness about Environment Conservation:

Environment Conservation awareness is created among students on and off campus through both theory and practicals. College provides a platform to students to employ their knowledge in practice by organizing tree plantation drives, Environment promotional rallies, celebration of various days on environment. The

NSS unit does a significant work on saving environment during NSS Special Winter Camps organized every year.

Sensitizing Students to Gender Issues:

College feels it its social responsibility to address gender issues by organizing various gender awareness programmes.

Exposure to Disaster Management:

Students are exposed to disaster management through activities like Disaster Management Workshops, Management of CCovid-19 epidemic. During the epidemic student volunteers having understood their social responsibility have prepared and distributed around 4 thousand masks. Students have collected and contributed to the State Relief fund for flood affected people.

Health and Hygiene Awareness:

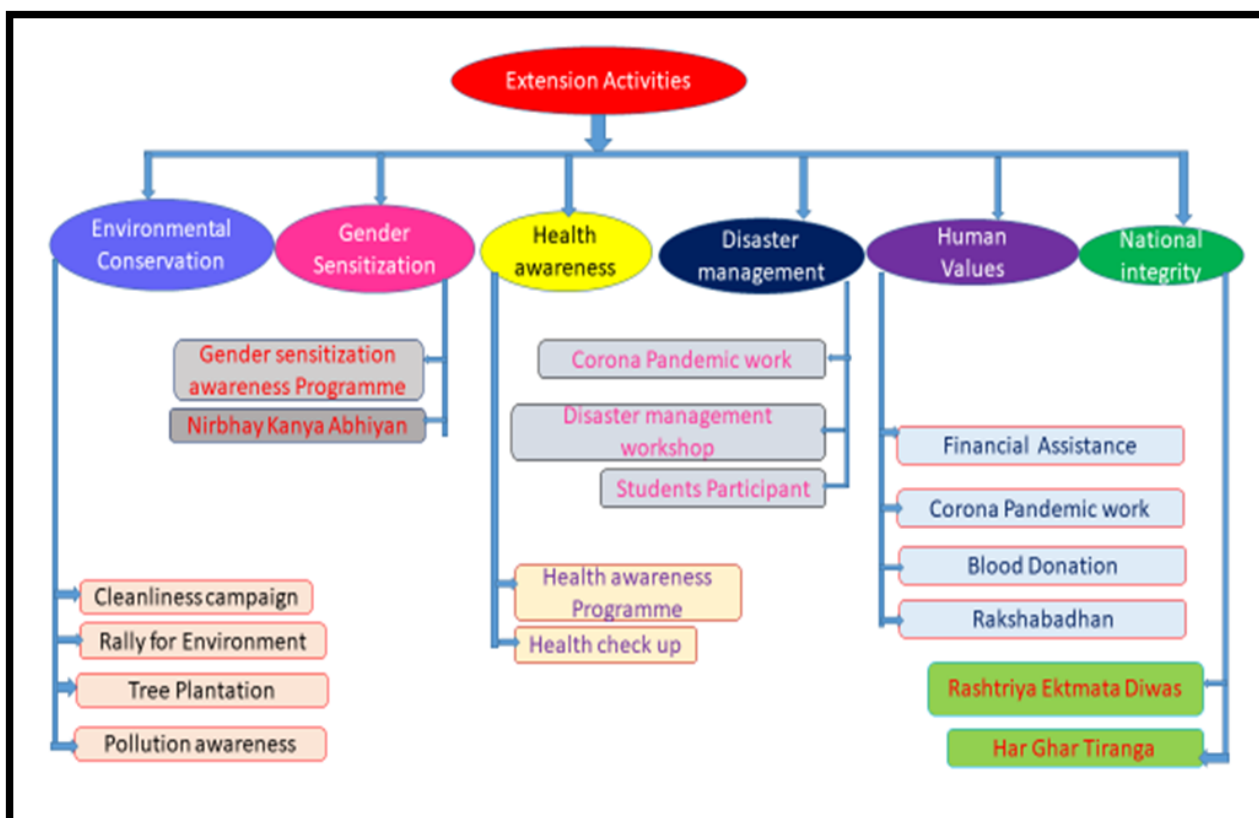
The issue of health and hygiene was of utmost importance during Covid-19 epidemic. College students played a pivotal role in prevention and eradication of this deadly disease. They also discharge their social duties by participating in AIDS awareness rallies, vaccination camps, health checkup etc.

Inculcation of Human Values and National Spirit:

Human values like brotherhood, affection, sympathy, empathy towards deprived sections of the society are imbibed among students through, Celebration Rakshabandhan with Prisoners, donations of funds to flood affected people, Donation of Blood and regular classroom activities. Students are made aware of their constitutional duties and obligations through celebration of days of National Importance.

Evidence of Success:

- Students planted around 1000 plants during the last five years both in and off campus plantation drives
- Students and faculty actively participated in observing 'No Vehicle Day'
- Students took imitative in measuring noise pollution level and taking necessary measures to minimize it.
- Students are motivated not to use plastic
- As a result of our efforts to provide safe and secure environment to girl students their enrollment is consistently sizable and there are hardly any grievances.
- Students' commitment towards society is reflected through their initiative in raising a relief fund of Rs. 43, 230 for the flood affected people.
- College students positively participated in vaccination programme organized local health department on college campus.
- All first year students volunteered to undergo health checkup.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- At the outset students were reluctant to participate in blood donation camp, but they overcame this fear after counseling session
- Initially students were uninterested to participate in extension activities which they thought to be of least importance in scoring marks
- During winter NSS camps issues of girls’ accommodation in remote villages was prominent

Objectives:

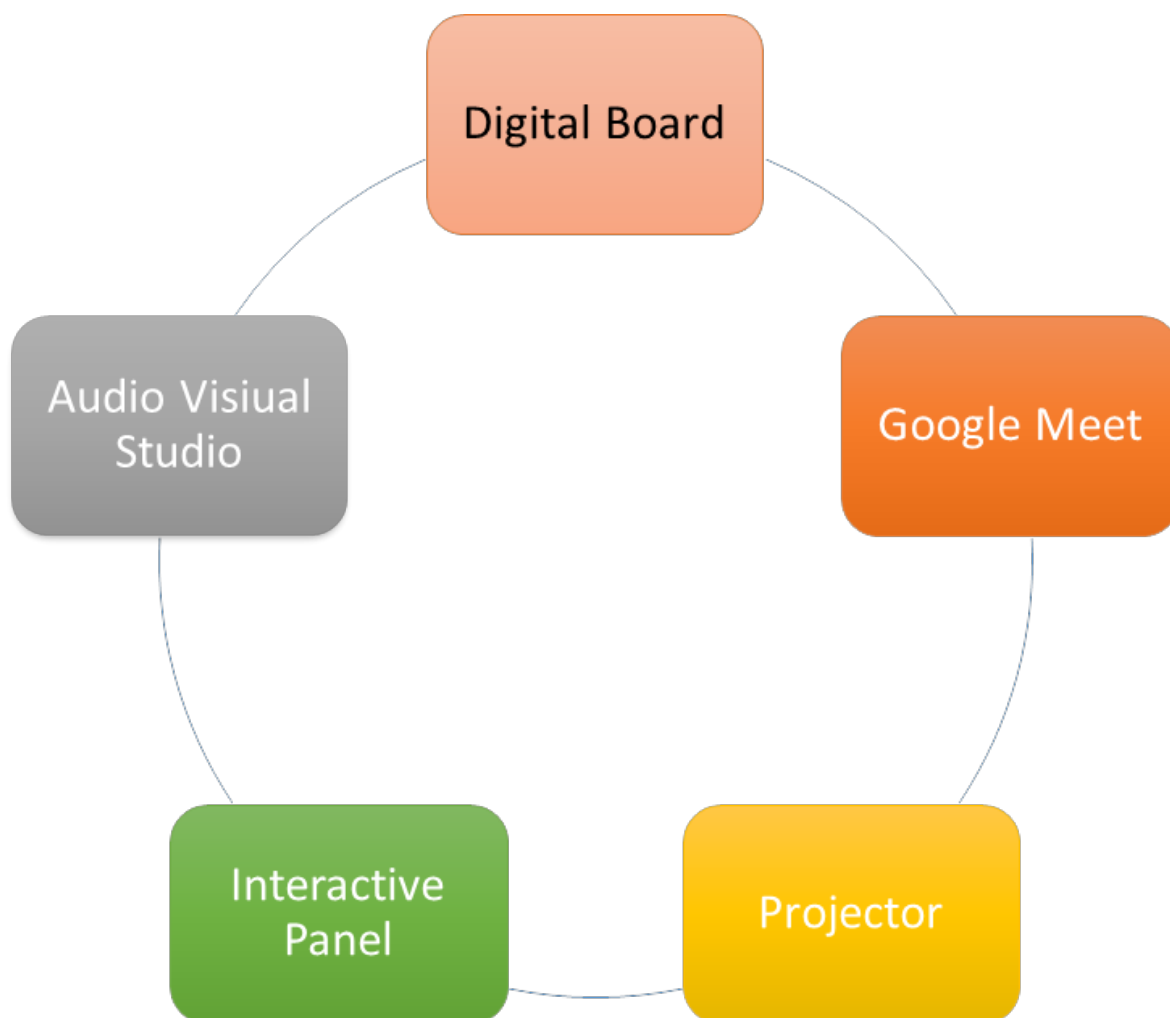
- To provide students an opportunity to learn at their own space and time

The Context:

Students in this era of Information Technology have been using online platforms to gather information about almost everything. ICT enabled teaching and learning process helps to enhance knowledge and skills. ICI integration provides meaningful and productive learning experiences through student centered classrooms.

The Practice:

Use of ICT has been a regular practice in the college. However, its need increased during Covid-19 lockdown period. In order to overcome this difficulty of reaching out to students, college explored a number of ways. Initially it was decided to use appropriate ICT tools for imparting education. This goal was fulfilled by extensive use of various social platforms like Zoom, Google Meet, Google Classroom etc. Teachers have also prepared a number of short educational videos using apps like Kinemaster, Screen Recording and OBS studio. Recognizing the need to have an exclusive E-Content Development Studio, college with an investment of Rs. 7 Lakh developed a state of the art Audio-Visual Studio in order to create E-Content for the benefit of students. Teachers have been using various ICT tools such as LCD Projectors, Interactive Boards and Virtual Study Material



Evidence of Success:

- All faculty learned how to use ICT tools for effective teaching-learning process
- Faculty prepared more than 1000 short educational video and disseminated them to students through various social media platforms

- Barrier free learning environment
- The college could continue its teaching learning process with same force during lockdown
- Students learn at their own space and time

Problems Encountered and Resources Required:

- Many students from remote villages faced network issues
- Some faculty members were initially unaware about the technology
- Initially, students were also unaware about the online learning platforms.
- Initially, adequate state of the art infrastructure for recording educational video was not available

Beyond Academics: Role of CIDA

Premise for Establishment:

Role of any educational institution is to make holistic development of its students. Our college has been performing its duties since its inception. As college is centrally located in town and has hardly any scope for expansion, the existing campus of 4 acres was not sufficient to cater to the diverse needs of students. Most of the space of the main campus being utilized for academic purposes, there was hardly any space left for sports and games. It was need of the hour to have dedicated campus for sports and games. Therefore, in the year 2009, the parent institute purchased a land admeasuring 3.75 acres in the vicinity. Since then, college has developed this barren land into a vibrant sports complex. Shevgaon and its adjacent area is regarded as a breeding ground for security personnels. Most of the army and paramilitary forces are drawn from Shevgaon and its adjacent area. These security personnel are role models for college students. Students have a great craze for defence services. To train and groom these budding security personnel, no training institute was available in the neighborhood. Therefore, identifying students’ needs and their

inclination for defence services, the college started a training institute called CIDA. This academy is aimed at nurturing requisite physical and mental skills for recruitment in armed forces.

Facilities Available in CIDA:

CIDA is spread over a beautiful and lush green campus of 3.75 acres. It has a large and spacious indoor stadium for variety of indoor games. Its outdoor campus is used for variety of outdoor games like *Kho-Kho*, *Kabaddi*, Cricket, Volley Ball, Basket Ball, tournaments etc. The campus is also equipped with an Open Gym, 400 m running and jogging track. For convenience of sports persons, there is a provision of suite and washrooms.

Modus Operandi:

College has devised out a policy for usage of this campus. Free access is given to the currently enrolled students of the college. The enrolled students, teams of players have to book the facilities beforehand. These facilities are used for intra and inter collegiate competitions. College has maintained a register wherein students and outsiders can register their names on daily basis. This campus is used by the neighbouring community for morning and evening walks, jogging, Yoga and exercises. College meets the maintenance cost of this campus partially through the special budget allocated for the same and partially through the revenue generated out of registration fees.

This campus hosts a training programme to help students prepare for Physical Examination for recruitment in armed forces. It conducts a series of Experts' lectures to orient students to the nature and structure of ground tests and written examinations. Every year around 50 students are formally enrolled for the training programme. They attend regular classes as well as undergo physical training required for recruitment in armed forces. The aims and objectives of CIDA are as follows:

- Provide physical training to aspirants of armed forces
- To guide students about written examinations conducted for recruitment in armed forces
- To arrange Experts' lectures
- To conduct physical fitness workshop
- To train students for ground tests
- To carry out holistic development of students
- To involve neighboring community in its extension activities

Activities Conducted:

Experts' Lectures and Activities:

- Prof. Sandipan Ghutal and Prof. Sachin Fadatara delivered a lecture on 'Preparation of Police and Army Examinations'.
- Mr. S. V. Tambe delivered a lecture on 'Current Affairs'
- Mr. Appasaheb Pawar, DySP, (Maharashtra Police Training Academy, Nashik) interacted with students. He talked on "Preparation of Competitive Examinations".

Physical Training Sessions:

- Mr Krushna Vadane conducted a practical session on 'Physical Training for Recruitment in Armed

Forces’.

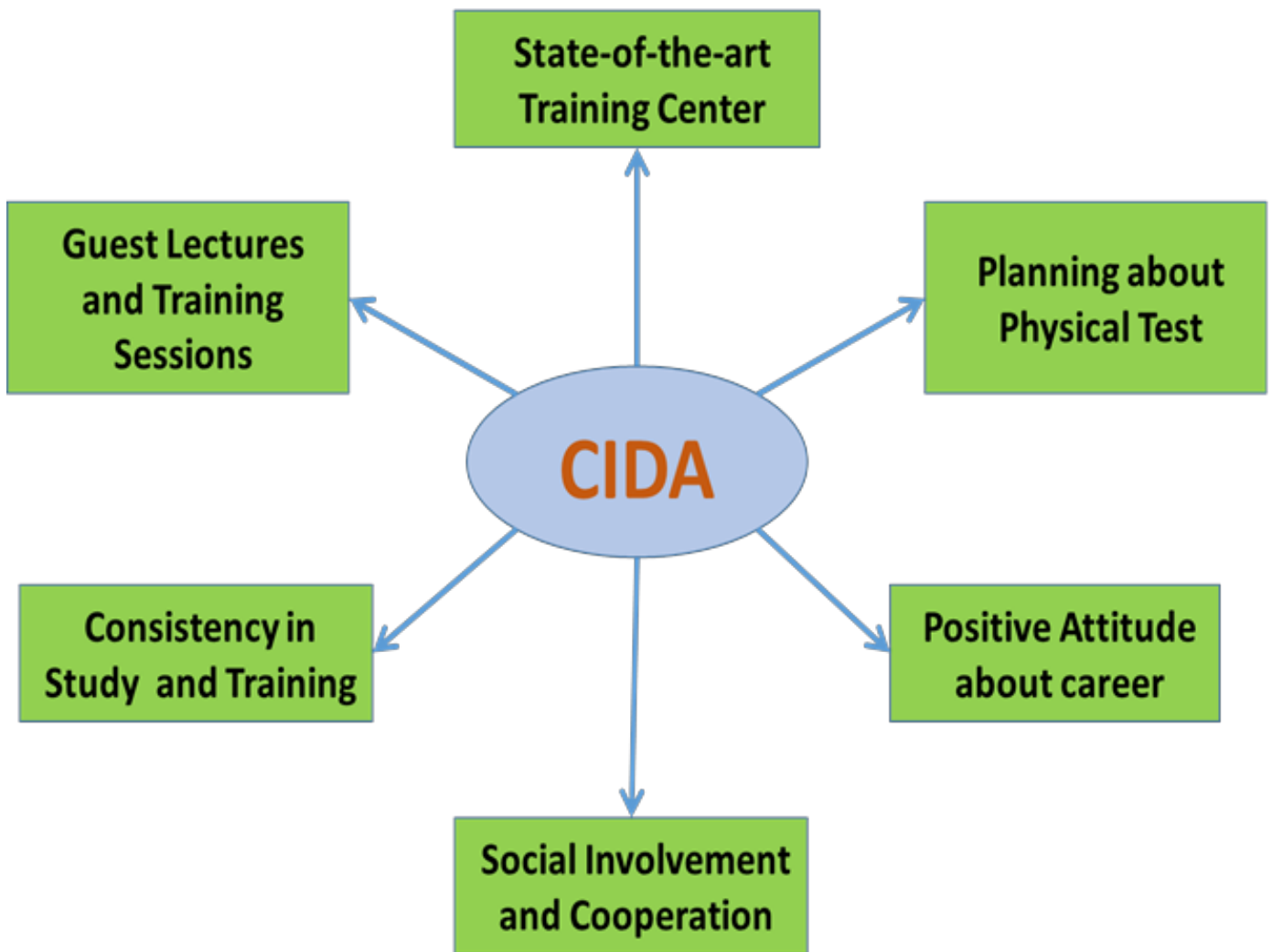
- Mr. Bhosale Ashok Bhausahab (Naik, Maratha Light Infantry, Indian Army) guided students on ‘Preparation of Physical Examination for Police and Army Recruitment’.
- Mr. Sachin Salave, (Major and Mechanical Engineer, Indian Army, Asaam) conducted a practical session on ‘Skills Required for Police and Army Personnel’

Regular Classes for preparation of Examination:

- College faculty contributes in conducting theory classes on topics relevant for police and army examinations. Occasionally, experts are also invited to contribute to preparation of theory examination.

Outcomes Achieved:

- The students understood the value of physical fitness and sound health.
- They also understood the nature and structure of theory examinations.
- These programmes made students confident to take the examinations.
- The training dispelled exam phobia from students’ minds.
